To say that the past couple of months have been a busy season at FPC is a little like saying people in Chicago are excited about the Cubs winning the World Series! (Yes, I know it's been almost six months ... but it was 108 years in the making). Anyway, with all that's been happening, I wanted to take some time in this edition of our *Messenger* to share some highlights, give you a couple of exciting updates, and extend an important invitation.

First, I want to give a huge shout-out to our staff and volunteers who have done such a great job of helping our church navigate this time of transitions. All of our staff have picked up additional responsibilities and have done so with the same energy and enthusiasm that they have always had about being a part of the FPC team. I'm so grateful for these wonderful colleagues in ministry.

I also want to thank the countless volunteers who have stepped up to serve in more ways than I could possibly name: from working at the office's front desk to managing administration and logistics behind the scenes. I know that some of our recent transitions have been a challenge on both a personal and organizational level and deeply appreciate everyone's support and engagement leading us to continue moving forward.

Speaking of moving forward, we're proud to announce two new colleagues who will be joining the team soon. Our new Office Manager is Paula Beeken, a recent transplant from Texas who brings years of local church administration and ministry experience with her. Paula began her work in the beginning of May, and, among other responsibilities, will help to manage our church calendar and building use, train

and coordinate volunteers, manage the daily operations of the office, and provide administrative support to the Session and the Pastor.

We also welcome Alyssa Johnson as our new Coordinator for Children's Music. Alyssa is a familiar presence at FPC, having sung in the choir and having led our children's music during VBS for several years. She is a music teacher at Zach Elementary School and brings phenomenal experience and enthusiasm. She will join us in August and begin leading this ministry in the fall. One additional note is that our new Children's Ministry position has been posted online, including our website, and the search is underway, so if you or someone you know is interested, let us know right away!

Finally, I want to remind you of some special events to put on your calendar for this summer. On Sunday, May 28, we will move to our summer worship schedule of one service at 10:00 a.m. every week through Sunday, September 3. This will give us a wonderful opportunity for the whole community to worship at one time and enjoy fellowship together. On Sunday, August 20, we will have the second part of our annual meeting immediately following the service, and on Sunday, August 27, we will have our annual all-church picnic after the service. More information about both of these events will be available later this summer.

One last item to add to your summer calendar this year is the Global Leadership Summit on August 10–11. This is a national event hosted by Willow Creek Community Church outside of Chicago and simulcast around the world in hundreds of locations, including Crossroads Church in Loveland, which serves as our local site. For over 20 years, this event has

featured world-class leaders in the areas of church, business, social, civic, and political life. I have personally been attending the Summit for the past seven years and always find that the content is inspiring, practical, and motivational in multiple areas of my life. I always leave with a new stack of books to read, new ideas for ministry, and new commitments for learning and growing in my own discipleship and leadership.

This year, for the first time, FPC is an official partner church with Crossroads Church, which gives us access to a great discount for our members—only \$99 for the two-day event if you register by June 27. From there, click the link to register, then choose the Crossroads Church site in Loveland and enter priority code SPC17, which will allow you to sign up for the discounted rate. We'll send more information out over the next couple of weeks, but we hope you'll get this on your calendar soon.

Pastor Bill Hybels, the founder of Willow Creek Church and the Summit, often reminds us that the local church is the hope of the world. I absolutely believe that and know that our local church has been, is, and will continue to be a vital and vibrant part of our community, changing lives on behalf of Jesus Christ. That is what motivates us to overcome the challenges of busy seasons, times of transitions, and shared discernment about the future. # THE HOMELESS HAVE NAMES

## FAITH FAMILY HOSPITALITY OFFERS TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

### **Bobby, Judy, Jeremy, Fawn, Zayden, Julissa, Yuly, Baby Olivia ...**

Those are the names of just a few of our cherished former guests. Were you a part of helping to sustain their spirits and wellbeing during their lowest days in homelessness? Did they transform you in an awakening moment of grace while you were serving them during their stay at FPC, Peak Church, or the Day Center?

### **They are all home now! More than 141 of them!**

The expansion that Faith Family Hospitality has experienced since its inception less than 5 years ago is testament to the deep commitment of the Fort Collins faith community to help its neighbors experiencing the despair of homelessness. There are now a total of 32 faith communities participating in housing families and supporting the Day Center. More congregations are talking about coming onboard. What began as an overnight family shelter has grown to include the network of support needed by our vulnerable parents and children to heal and achieve sustainable

self-sufficiency in a timely manner. Programs have expanded to now include primary case management, a partnership with over 20 local agencies that help our families address their various needs, a full-service family-friendly Day Center, and a project to provide transitional housing for seven to eight families.

The additional support has enabled family success rates in finding employment to rise from 18% to 86% and the median days from shelter to housing to decline from 68 to 58 days. Once transitional housing is in place, a national benchmark is expected of 75% to 80% success in achieving permanent housing for guest families.

FPC has been a strong supporter of the Transitional House project. As a result of the Housing Families activities and fundraisers in 2016, FPC was able to provide appliances for all three kitchens in the house. More than 25 people from FPC attended a Hard Hat Party that raised more than \$32,000 for the Transitional House

These are the names of some of our current cherished guests. They are mothers, fathers, students, employees, children, and babies, all of them experiencing homelessness. These guests or others like them will be living at FPC from June 18 to June 25. Do you have time to touch their lives or allow them into your heart through the ministry of presence?

Sign up to set up rooms, provide meals, host for an evening, or host overnight at some point during the week of June 18. We can provide training and support. # FORGIVE

## **I can forgive and forget ... I just don't want you to forget that I forgave!**

As strange as those words seem, there is a bit of truth to them. Forgiveness is no small or easy thing, and we may possibly find ourselves forgiving for the wrong reason. Because forgiveness takes strength *and* courage, we just want that other person to remember that we actually did that for them. Yet that's not what God commands of us: We are to forgive as the Lord forgave us—not keeping score, not reminding someone we forgave—we are to simply forgive.

When I think of forgiveness, I am reminded always of two young boys who had an altercation on the playground at the school where I served as an administrator. I “created an opportunity” for them to apologize to one another before they went off to play, and they did. However, Sam, the youngest of the two, said to Darin (after he apologized), “Will you forgive me?” Darin replied, “Sure. Let's go swing!” I wanted to make Darin ask for forgiveness, too, but instead, after Darin ran off, I asked Sam, “How did that make you feel just now?” I, of course, was referring to the fact that Darin hadn't asked for forgiveness, but Sam replied, “I feel fine. My mom says it always feels good to ask someone to forgive you if you've done something wrong, and it does!” And then, he was off to the swings.

I have thought of that day often. As much as I wanted Darin to reciprocate, it didn't happen. But that didn't stop Sam. He had done what he needed to do for himself. He didn't excuse Darin's behavior, but he wasn't going to let the fact that Darin hadn't asked for forgiveness from him destroy anything in himself. We will not always be met with a receptive heart when we ask for forgiveness or when we forgive.

Forgiveness is just plain hard! We find ourselves working at forgiving someone who doesn't *want* forgiveness (because they feel they didn't do anything wrong), or we are working at forgiving the unforgivable. I suspect that we often feel that when we forgive someone, we give them permission to “do it again.” I suppose we run that risk, but we also run it if we don't forgive. We often base our forgiveness a bit on the other “deserving” it.

Our job is to treat others honorably. We will always run into people who are perhaps rude, unfair, critical, etc., but if we treat people according to how they treat us, then very soon will have changed who *WE* are for the worse. Our guidelines come from God, not from how others treat us. Forgiveness is a choice, a decision. You rarely wake up in the morning thinking, “Today I'm going to forgive...” The question is: Which do you hold closer—the need to be right or the need to forgive?

I'm no Pollyanna. I have harbored hurts a long time, and I know that asking for forgiveness can be downright painful. Forgiving offenses against you or ones you love feels nearly impossible at times. Asking forgiveness or forgiving someone else doesn't always make us feel better or make the situation better. But it's a good place to start. I know that because God spelled it out for us and because He demonstrated it for us. The last words of Jesus on the cross were, “Forgive them.”

Every morning, God's mercies are new. Are ours? We often want to put a question mark where God has put a period. He has commanded that we forgive one another as He forgave us. Period.

# LIBRARY CORNER

## THE WORD SOURCE

New in your Word Source Library are Brazos Theological Commentaries on Leviticus; 1 Samuel; 1 and 2 Kings; Ezra and Nehemiah; Esther and Daniel; and Psalm 1–50.

A gift of six volumes from the Brazos Old Testament Commentaries has been presented to the church library. This brings our series to 10 volumes between Genesis and Daniel. As noted previously in *The Messenger*, Brazos Press has a goal to present scripture creedally for the 21st century. Indexes in each volume have cross references to New Testament passages.

In the Leviticus commentary, author Ephraim Radner writes about the Tabernacle, Moses, Aaron, high priests, sin, sacrifices, holiness, and atonement, foreshadowing what we have in the New Testament book of Hebrews. In turn, Hebrews plays upon Leviticus. In an Amazon review, K. Barth says, "Radner makes Christological connections that dominate and enliven the entire book."

In the Psalms 1–50 commentary, Ellen Charry provides many New Testament

references. Her subtitle *Sighs and Songs of Israel* will strike a familiar note to the hearts of readers of the Psalms. Reviews credit Charry with "deep theological wisdom and human experience." It's been said that "she mines the Psalms for theological and pastoral value for all they are worth" and provides "daily bread for the brokenhearted Jews and Christians."

If one feels inclined to delve into Old Testament history, the following four volumes are a prize:

*1 Samuel* by Francesca Murphy and *1 & 2 Kings* by Peter Leithart cover the histories of Israel from Saul to the Exile.

In *1 Samuel*, Murphy presents Saul as taking the first steps toward political government, whereas his rival David is called a chieftain and a social anthropologist.

The *Journal of Evangelistic Theology* says that in *1 & 2 Kings* Peter Leithart "aspires to bring the Old Testament to the church as an ongoing source of revelation in a refreshing way."

Readable sections summarize the Biblical chapters.

In *Ezra & Nehemiah*, Matthew Levering brings the Hebrews back from exile. The rebuilding of the temple, return to the Torah, renewal of the Covenant, and Jeremiah's prophecies are mingled with Christological references.

*Esther & Daniel* by Samuel Wells and George Sumner is best described by Duke Divinity Professor Ellen Davis: "A fascinating conversation between two books that captures opposite aspects of faith. In *Esther* God seems to disappear from history, leaving the faithful to their own desperate devices. And in *Daniel* we read about God breaking into the chaos of history. Imaginatively and convincingly, Wells and Sumner show the theological, ethical, and even missional importance of these 'outlier' books within the Christian canon. This book is designed to stimulate serious conversation in the church."

# ALERTNESS AND FLEXIBILITY

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The character quality for May 2017 is **ALERTNESS (vs. carelessness)**.

**Alertness is being aware of what is taking place around me so that I can have the right response.**

Alertness is often the first prevention against sin in a believer's life. In I Corinthians 10:13, Paul states, "No temptation has seized you except what is common to man. And God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can stand up under it" (NIV). When temptation comes to lure us into sin, God has promised to provide an escape.

So how can we be alert to sin and to God's divine escape route? First, know God! The more we know God, the more sensitive we are to His Spirit and can discern when He is warning us from a certain path. *Knowing God's Word is the key!* It must be studied and pondered. Psalm 119:11 states, "I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you" (NIV). And Psalm 1 says, "Blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked or stand in the way of sinners or sit in the seat of mockers. But his delight is in the law of the LORD, and on his law he meditates day and night" (NIV). The more we study and meditate on God's Word, the more we will know Him. This relationship with God helps us to be more sensitive to His Spirit—thus recognizing temptation when it arrives.

A thorough understanding of God's Word will lead us to a more intimate relationship with Him. While cultivating this relationship, we must also remain alert to ourselves. Alertness requires that you are aware of situations that could lead to sin. Ask God to grant you wisdom that you may be more aware of

yourself and give you the strength you need to change directions when temptation lurks around the corner. Rely on and trust God and the power of the Holy Spirit in every way, every day!

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The character quality for June is **FLEXIBILITY (vs. resistance)**. **Flexibility can be defined as willingness to change plans or ideas without getting upset.**

Life is made up of change. This is true at home, on the job, or at school. People change, seasons change, fads change, and on it goes. We live in a world of unprecedented and constant change. No matter how hard we plan, our plans change and our lives change. But God does not change! His love and grace are the same yesterday, today, and forever. He is always with us, no matter where we are or what we are doing.

However, to be able to deal with all those things in our lives that do change requires flexibility. A rigid and unbending spirit can be harmful, both to others and to the one who holds it. Sickness or a tough job situation can call for major change in our lives. How do we cope with these things? How do we stay at peace when changes disrupt our lives? Or how do we maintain a sweet spirit when changes occur, especially those created by others with

whom we may not agree? Other people's ideas and styles may differ greatly from ours. Sometimes in our families or sometimes in our churches, new situations arise that create turmoil. We often find it very difficult to be understanding and flexible. This may be especially true for those of us who are a bit older. We should not give up personal convictions, but we do need to try to understand others' points of view.

It is also critically important for us to remember that it is God who ultimately orders our steps. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will direct your paths" (Proverbs 3:5-6). This is not to say that we should not have goals or plans. They are important to an organized life, but we must always remember that God is the ultimate ruler in our lives and in the universe. God's view is so all-encompassing, whereas ours, in comparison, is so limited that we must yield every moment to His direction, even in the midst of our planning and goal-setting. So when our plans change unexpectedly, we need to remember that God has a hand in the smallest details of our lives. When changes come along, don't be inflexible and disappointed. Be flexible, anticipate the best, and above all, trust God in all things.

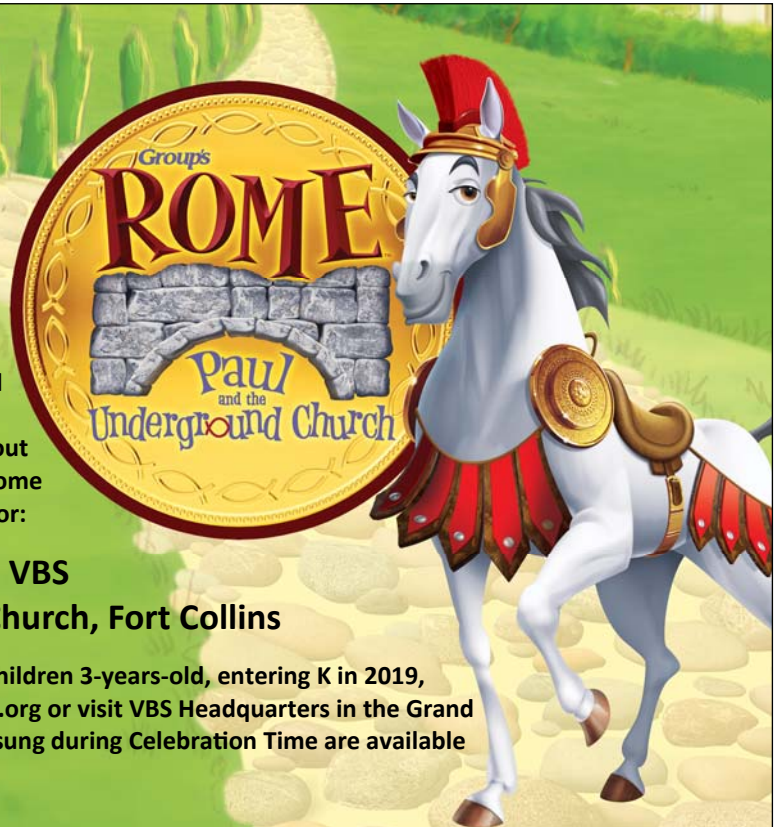
